A dog's behavior may change based on surroundings, training, medical, socialization, and life experiences.

Gray A5770676 (Intact) retreated to the rear of the kennel when the runner arrived, exhibiting a nervous demeanor with a trembling body. The kennel divider was lowered to prevent further escape. The runner was required to step into the kennel as Gray distanced himself into a corner. Once leashed, he pulled back, refusing to exit on his own. A roll-cart was required to transport him to the catch pen, where he was collared and leashed without issue. Gray was guided into the yard and chose to sit near the exit, displaying a slightly tense posture when approached by some of the dogs. He remained in the same location for most of the session, showing no interest in the other dogs. However, Gray became animated when his sibling was introduced into the yard, as he greeted with a relaxed body and a wagging tail. He first greeted his sibling and then proceeded to follow the other dog around the yard. He briefly engaged in light play, preferring to interact with his sibling only. For the remainder of the session, he continued to interact with the same dog, coexisting with everyone else. Once the session concluded, he remained in the yard to begin his small dog assessment. Gray may benefit from confidence-building and leash training.

Gray A5770676 (Intact) was allowed to decompress prior to the assessment. A small dog was introduced while Gray rested on the grass, appearing shut down. He showed no initiative, remaining in the same position while exhibiting a timid demeanor the entire time as the small dog sniffed him. Gray displayed a slightly tense posture, with a nervous gaze, a low tail, ears slightly back, and a closed mouth. The session concluded as Gray showed no interest or concerning behavior throughout the session. He was then returned to his kennel in a roll-cart as he refused to walk.
